In two short days it will be of their time in the woods and there were times that we dragged one of the old timers with us to make sure we got it right. Those old men had a lot on input in what these young men got for Christmas.

> They first started educating us when we were five or six years old, they told us what's the best type of BB guns should we get and later when it came to shotguns and deer

It reminded me of many years ago.

Today I go alone into the woods on Christmas Eve. I strap the snowshoes on and after dark I go through the woods along the south branch of the Au Sable River. Just before dark, I watch the deer as they gather in the swamps, all I hear is the swishing of snow as I walk with the snowshoes; I watch the deer as they gather. I see a snow owl roosting in a tree, staring at me for a while then he flies away



A Glimpse Into The Past

The Lansing State Journal ran a series of photos in a "Know Your State" feature in the 1940s. Harrison was featured in a 1942 issue with photos of the Clare County Courthouse, Harrison Schools, the Congregational Church and the above photo of Main Street. The bank is on the corner of Main and Second Street, the garage (later the roller rink), the post office and at far right, the Clare County Cleaver. Part of the caption reads, "The story of Harrison, the last in the "Know Your Michigan" series will be told in a broadcast over radio station WKAR at East Lansing. Starting next Sunday The State Journal will start a new series with pictures showing the war effort of the various towns and cities in the area."



PEOPLE vs. PALMER & **MCINTYRE** FEBRUARY 24, 1906 -

Adultery In Surrey **Township**

Robert Hutchinson signed a Criminal Complaint before Justice of the Peace Algernon S. Young on February 24, 1906 alleging that on January 1, 1906, to February 17, 1906, George Palmer (not George W. Palmer, the Farwell mail carrier and grandfather of the present Palmer Hardware Store owner) and Luella McIntyre committed adultery in Garfield Township.

A Warrant was issued, defendant George and defendant Luella were arrested, and on arraignment they waived preliminary examination. Bond was set at \$300 each.

Prosecutor John Quinn filed an Information on February 26th endorsing as witnesses Robert Hutchinson, Sheldon Lake, Robert Carson, J.C. Owens, and Ruby McIntire. Judge Peter F. Dodds signed for each defendant a Warrant For Removal of Prison to

Any Prison on February 27th on sentencing each defendant to the Detroit House of Correction for "the period of not more than One year, and not less than 6 months."

The Clare County Jail Register has George Palmer, age 35, as inmate # 958, and Luella McIntyre, age 37, as inmate # 959, both noted to have bad social condition, admitted on February 12, 1906, and discharged to Detroit on February 28th for a period of 6 months to one year. Each defendant was noted to have been previously sentenced "once".

This writer wonders if the admission date of February 12th is correct given the fact that the Complaint and Warrant were issued on February 26th.



'Best year' in long time boosts Christmas tree farms

LANSING - Christmas trees are in Levi Dutcher's blood.

His parents planted 2,000 while his mother was pregnant with him in 1988. Now, he is preparing for his first holiday season as the owner of a choose-and-cut Christmas tree

"It takes a lot of work and a lot of money to make a little bit of money in the end," said Dutcher, of Old Grove Christmas Tree Farm in Caledonia. "But it's definitely a lot of fun."

Dutcher is one of nearly 500 Michigan Christmas tree farm owners benefiting this year from an exceptional growing season.

"It was pretty much the consensus of the Michigan Christmas Tree Association board that it was the best year they've had for growing in a long time," said Amy Start, the executive director of the group that promotes Christmas tree farms.

Dutchman Tree Farms near Cadillac benefited from ideal weather conditions in northern Michigan.

"We had decent moisture throughout the summer and did not have any late-season frosts," said Scott Powell, the nursery manager of Dutchman in Manton and president of the

A good growing season is a good sign, but when it comes to actually selling the trees, other factors come into play.

"Usually what affects the selling season is good weather," Start said.

"A little bit of snow for atmosphere is always lovely," she said. "But if not, we at least hope it's not raining. Because nobody wants to go to a farm when it's downpouring or muddy."

Michigan is third in the nation for Christmas tree production, according to the tree grower group. Each year the state supplies 2 million trees nationally.

Choose-and-cut farms appeal to younger families who want to "make a day of it," Start

"They feel as if it's the freshest way to get a tree," she said. "Because it is. You are cutting it down yourself."

That experience is the culmination of nearly a decade's worth of work for the farmer. It takes Christmas trees seven to 10 years before they are ready to cut.

Each growing season is critical and has lasting impacts for farmers beyond hat. Drought during one season can delay growth, Start said.

"It takes a lot of work and a lot of care to get them to the full size to sell so the growers are really, really diligent about those trees," she

Some new choose-and-cut farms are set to open to the public this year, but an opening is the completion of a project started long before - sometimes several decades.

Dutcher is opening his choose-and-cut farm this year, seven years after the trees were plant-

The events that led to the grand opening began before Dutcher was born. The 2,000 trees his mother helped plant in 1988 were nearly all wiped out by a drought.

When Dutcher was 8 years old, his parents sold trees for one year. They never did it again.

"During that season I thought 'Wow this is a lot of fun,'" Dutcher said. "The whole family was hanging out. I didn't come from a lot of money, so anytime someone came up to buy a \$20 tree, it was really exciting.

About 20 years later, Dutcher bought property in Caledonia, and his sister-in-law recommended planting Christmas trees so the family could gather each year and cut their own.

Dutcher took the idea one step further and planted 1,000 trees.

"It was a mixture of me remembering all the good times we had the one year my parents sold trees and my sister-in-law's suggestion," Dutcher said. "That's how we've arrived at this."

Dutcher's family will still bond over the farm, including his aunt, who will fly from Oregon to help out. Christmas tree farmers find other ways to make ends meet while the trees grow.

Photo ops with Santa and a firepit to roast marshmallows are ways that Creekside Christmas Trees in Port Austin attract local residents during the Christmas season.

Creekside owner Lisa Szymanski planted trees two years ago. She anticipates that the choose-and-cut portion of the farm will open in

"We are doing things on the retail side to keep us relevant and keep people in the area knowing that we are here and getting in the habit of coming," Szymanski said. ABOUT LIAM JACKSON

Many of us spend the holidays relaxing and sharing in goodwill with friends and family. But some bad actors use the holidays to take advantage of people's generous spirits. Scammers frequently target the older and other more vulnerable members of our communities. They pretend they are from Social Security or another government agency to steal your money or personal information.


Caller ID, texts, or documents sent by email may look official, but they are not. Fraudsters are calling to verify information about the 2023 cost-of-living adjustment for people who get benefits. Remember, this adjustment is automatic and a beneficiary does not need to verify anything. Social Security won't ask you to provide information or money to get your benefit increase. Know that how we do business with you doesn't change because it's the holidays. We may email or text you about programs and services, but we will never ask for personal information via email or text.

Social Security Administration Recognizing the signs of a scam can help you avoid falling victim to one. These scams primarily use the telephone to contact you, but scammers may also use email, text messages, social media, or U.S. Scammers pretend to be from an agency or organization you know to gain your trust. Scammers say there is a problem with your Social Security number or account. Scammers pressure you to act immediately. Scammers tell you to pay in a specific way.

Know what to look for and be alert. Scammers don't take days off and neither should you... when it comes to making sure you identify suspicious communications and report it. If you receive a questionable call, text, or email, hang up or don't respond and report it at oig.ssa.gov/report. Scammers frequently change their methods with new tactics and messages to trick people. We encourage you to stay up to date on the latest news and advisories by following SSA's Office of the Inspector General on LinkedIn, Twitter, and Facebook or subscribing to receive email alerts.

Deputies handling 1,757 of those those times. The slowest time of incidents. Other law enforcement, including Clare City Police, Michigan State Police and the Michigan DNR handled 906 incidents. Your county fire/rescue units handled 147, and MMR Ambulance responded to 177 calls. We currently have 138 people in our jail which consist of 5 Diverted Felons, 57 Federal Renters, and 76 locals.

Here is something I don't believe I have ever put in one of my articles, and that is the total number of calls that our Central Dispatch receives in a month. For the month of November 2022 there were 3,111 calls answered by our dispatchers. That number includes all 911 emergency, and regular non-emergency calls that came in. 



Clerk Outlines Proposal 22-2 Election Changes

Proposal 22-3 Recount Does Not Change Local Outcome

HARRISON - In her Dec. 14 report, Lori Mott, county clerk/register of deeds, began by telling the Clare County Board of Commissioners that the report would be her longest in a long time. She started with the statewide election proposal recount which touched on several counties, and in Clare County included only one of the two

precincts in Hayes Township. "As far as the Bureau of Elections can tell, there's no reason for any of the precincts that were picked," she said. "And when asked about it, they just said they 'had a secret sauce.'

Mott said that recount in Hayes, which was only for Proposal 22-3, ended with two less "yes" votes and three additional "no" votes. She went on to explain that such changes can be due to the way the machine reads the vote, i.e., when someone makes an "X" in the oval rather than filling it in.

"And sometimes voters will do it quickly, and they only get a little piece of the oval," she said. "And the machine won't read it.

Hayes Township did not change. "The Bureau of Elections doesn't expect a change in the final vote," Mott said.

She went on to describe the election procedural changes that will be necessitated by the passage of Proposal 22-2, and stated with the previous misperception that changes would not affect Clare County, as it has no townships with populations over 10,000. Mott said that was incorrect, that it affects everyone statewide, and then went on to describe some specifics and how

she plans to move forward. "The Bureau of Elections didn't have any recommendations for us at our conference," she said, explaining that at the time the election had just been completed, and the recount announced. "They haven't even had a chance to look at Proposal 22-2 to give their recommendations. That will be coming after the first of the year."

Mott clarified that the early vot-

ing portion of the proposal affects only federal and statewide elections, not local elections such as those held for school bonding proposals. She added that the nine-day early voting could be offered if the local units chose to do so.

"They also said the cost of early voting is going to fall on the county and local jurisdictions," Mott said. "The state is not getting any funding for the nine days of early voting. So, not only is it nine days of early voting, but it's 10 days of voting."

Commissioner Rick Fancon asked if there was an estimated cost, and Mott said that she is putting together a committee to discuss options [ahead of the Bureau of Elections giving its recommendations], because there is a desire to know what is best for this county.

"Sometimes these are passed based on what's best for big cities," she said. "And what's best for big cities is not always what's best for our small communities."

One possibility is consolidating a affidavit just like before the proposminimum of six precincts, but Mott expressed concern for the voter confusion that could cause due to possibly voting in different locals for various issue, i.e., school districts not common to all precincts.

The statistically daunting concern that comes with nine days of early voting is the requirement of having the polls open at least eight hours each day. Adding the presetup, teardown and securing of ballots, that reaches 10- to 12-hour days, all of which require paying additional people.

Mott also touched on the small change to overseas absentee voting, which requires not closing voting until six days after the election to accommodate ballots postmarked as late as 8 p.m. on election day.

She explained that clerks can already email ballots to absent voters 45 days prior to the election, which allows ample time to fill in and mail back the ballot. So, the Board of Canvassers can do its work, but the vote cannot be certified until after those additional six

Mott also addressed the photo ID requirement, saying nothing has changed because of that compo-

"You had the right to sign an affidavit if you didn't have your voter ID prior to this – you still have that," she said. "You don't have to show ID to vote; you can sign the

al passed.'

Mott said the most concerning part of the proposal, aside from the economic issues, is that once someone applies for an absentee ballot, they can be put on a permanent absent voter list. That exists currently, however, rather than requiring the voter to request an absentee ballot prior to each election, now the ballot will continue to be sent automatically.

"We're going to mail you ballots for each election, whether you want one or not," she said. "If you don't vote for six consecutive years, we'll stop doing that."

Fancon asked how that function will be audited, citing the example of the voter who is signed up to automatically receive a ballot then moves out of state.

"The only way we'll know you moved out of state is if you cancel your driver's license or the Secretary of State cancels you," she said. "I don't think it's going to be a huge issue in Clare County, because we're small. And our clerks do take your ballot envelope, look at your signature and look at the signature we have on file for you and make sure that signature

Mott then voiced concern that in a county with more than a million voters, there won't be adequate staff numbers to compare signa-

Next on the list was prepaid postage for the AV ballots, and Mott's anticipation that the funding will ultimately go to the taxpayer: a cost which, based on the 2020 election, would amount to \$11.4 million for each election just for postage. She said that amount is estimated to increase by \$4.3 million for the next presidential election. Mott noted that in 2024, that will mean three elections: the Presidential Primary, August Primary, and General Election.

Ballot drop boxes will now be required at each voting precinct, and voters will now be able to place their AV ballot applications in the drop boxes as well.

Moving on to donations and contributions, Mott said counties, cities and townships may now accept and use charitable donations and contributions to conduct and administer elections.

"So that's an option, if you want to get out there and see if someone wants to fund our elections," she

In summary, Mott said that elections will cost the county more money, and require more coordinating, planning and executing from her office. She told commissioners to be aware of the possibility she could approach them seeking to hire an additional employee.

"There's a lot to think about, and a lot that's going to have to go into this," she said.
